Message from the Chair of Avon IA

Dear Members, Non-members, Ostomates, Pouchies, Friends and Families, I never imagined I would be penning this latest Newsletter for you at least a month into 'Lockdown'. Just one of the words and abbreviations with which we have all become familiar, but which would have been unrecognisable before this crazy chapter of our lives opened.

I have continued to work a little bit, in what is termed 'cold' General Practice, and the most striking thing for me, beside doing the majority of my work on the telephone, is the thought 'Where have all the patients gone?' Vast numbers of everyday problems and ills

are being stored away by people, not wanting to bother their GP I suspect during the Pandemic, also having anxieties about contact with the virus or inadvertently spreading it.

I have been spending some of my time off reading, this has included the book recommended by our November 2019 meeting speakers from The Cotswold Chine School: 'My Name is Why' by Lemn Sissay. It is a memoir of his childhood, growing up in Care in late 60's- mid 1980's Wigan. It is an emotionally engaging read, which I tore through wanting him to be alright and survive the injustices and rejections.

Near the end of the book he discovers various support and pressure groups, including NAYPIC (National Association of Young People in Care).

"Thank God for pressure groups. Had it not been for NAYPIC and WHO CARES and Black and In Care and the Abasindi Co-op I am not sure I would be here today. At the NAYPIC conference in Oxford there were young people from children's homes and foster care from all over the country. It was breathtaking to be around so many people who had similar experiences."

This sentiment reminded me of IA and all it has done to support me and many others. His comment about the National Conference echoed my feelings when attending National Council / Information Days but also our local meetings and get togethers too.

Although we can't meet in person for the time being; know that my thoughts are with you all at this difficult time and if you need any support please get in touch.


